
The Board approved a donation to KWGS in consideration for the many times the radio station provides announcements and advertisements helping promote GAST's events.

News from the Arts President

Our involvement with Tulsa area community events continues to grow. Speaker's Bureau projects at PricewaterhouseCoopers and Skelly Elementary School were quite successful thanks to **Barbara Taron**, **Fred Rother** and **Doris Gallagher**. On April 5, GAST members participated in the opening of the "Kindred Spirits" exhibit of Native American art at Tulsa Community College, Southeast Campus. This unique and exciting showing of Native American paintings and sculptures will travel to Tulsa's Sister City Celle/Germany in August 2002 where it will be displayed at the Celle Castle for public viewing.

GAST and the Arts Association also supported the Tulsa Philharmonic production of OOMPAH POPS! on April 20 which turned out to be a delightful combination of classical Johann Strauss and Rodgers and Hammerstein compositions, well known German folk songs, yodeling and Bavarian beer drinking songs. Maikönigin Jill Hammer, her daughter Madeline, Carol and Don Wright and Barbara and Bernie Sciescinski handed out programs at the Brady Theater event in their best dirndl dresses and lederhosen.

On Sunday, April 21 we were honored with a special presentation by the The Albert and Hete Barthelmes Foundation. Co-directors Theresa M. Collins and Joseph L. Hull III were introduced by former GAST and GASAA president **Josef Hardt.** Ms. Collins and Mr.

Hull talked about the Foundation's plans for a Conservatory of Music to be built at 14th Street and Cheyenne. A pilot program will start in September 2002 at the University United Methodist Church, TU Campus. Dr. Katharine Ogonek, Executive Director of Opus 118, Harlem, NY, told how much can be accomplished with disadvantaged youngsters in the Inner City, when given the opportunity. The story of Opus 118 has also been told in the movie "Music of the Heart". The musical presentation continued with an excellent performance by the Barthelmes Conservatory String Quartet of the Tulsa Youth Symphony. The reception that followed was organized by co-chairs Lois Voeller and Gabi Richardson with the help of Darlene Tegeler. John Millar was in charge of set up. Thank you all for a job well done.

When school reconvened after the Christmas break, the teacher asked her young pupils to write a story of how they spent the holidays. Little Johnny report went like this:

"We always used to spend Christmas with Grandpa and Grandma. They used to live here in a brick house, when Grandpa worked, but now they are retarded and moved to Arizona. They live in a place with a lot of other retarded people. The place is called an Arvie Park. They all live in houses made of tin. They ride great big tricycles and they wear name tags, because they don't know who they are. They play all day long in a big building they call a WRECK CENTER, but if it was wrecked it's all fixed now. They do exercises there too, but they don't do too good.

There is a swimming pool and they go to it, but all they do is stand in the water with their hats on. I guess they don't know how to swim any more either.

They get to go on a bus for a field trip to the beach and other places. At the beach they pick up rocks and shells, which some think are dollars.

My grandma used to make cookies and stuff, but she must have forgot how. Nobody cooks, they eat at restaurants on an "Early Bird Menu" and cut out coupons. Some of the people are so retarded that they don't know how to cook at all. So my Grandma and Grandpa and some of the others bring food into the wrecked hall and they call it a "pot luck".

When you come into the place, there is a doll house where a man sits all the time, watching so nobody gets out without him seeing them. Grandma says my grandpa worked all his life and now they are retarded and having fun, but I wish they'd move back here. But I guess the man at the gate won't let them out.

It sure was great for me to get back home."
