Dear Members,



Farty Talk

This past year, **Teresa Gallagher**, had the daunting task of seeing to it that our GAST parties came off without a hitch. We owe Teresa a tremendous thank- you for a job well done!

For new members who may not be aware, our GAST year runs from the beginning of June to the end of May. As of June, I will be your new Socials chairperson in charge of monthly parties, such as Maiball, Fasching, Lumpenball and the like. To this end I will need lots of volunteer help and also your input regarding the events you have enjoyed and why you enjoyed them.

My intention is to assemble a core group, augmented by a larger base group, sub-divided into the various tasks required to execute an event. The number of individuals needed on each group may vary. It should always be no less than 3 and no more than 20. This should allow us to rotate and spread duties over a larger segment of our membership. The only segment that I foresee coming up to bat for each event is the Core Group. If you are interested in helping, please contact me at 743-4353 or via email at ursulagabriele@cox.net. Here are the categories for you to consider – you may sign up for more than one group – a main qualification for all categories is the desire to have fun and to help create fun for the membership at large:

Core Group – this is the group that plans the parties – picks the theme and determines how that theme will be carried out. This group will also be responsible for polling the membership to learn what parties members have attended in the past and which events they liked best and why. Additional qualifications: creativity; a good sense of humor.

Base Group – Greeting and Attendance – this group will be the most visible group to the membership and involves checking in members and guests as they arrive at an event, collecting any fees that may apply, extending name tags, and acting as ambassadors of introduction to those who may be attending their first GAST event. The theme of this group will be: 'Hi, how are you, have you been here before!' They will be responsible for seeing to it that no member or guest ends up at a table by themselves. They will field both complaints and compliments. Additional qualifications: the ability to smile; a genuine love of people and diplomacy.

Base Group – Set Up and Tear down – this group will be responsible for putting the Core groups' vision into practice, where the physical element of a party is concerned. They will assist in setting up tables and chairs and decorating. Additional qualifications: an enjoyment of decorating; the ability to smile while doing grunt work; the desire for instant gratification when you see a project come together.

Base Group – Food – this group will be responsible for selecting the food to be served at an event, in line with the theme chosen by the core group. It will be their job to comparison shop caterers for quality as well as price and to come up with fresh ideas for our 2003/2004 parties. Additional qualifications: good taste buds; an innovative spirit; an understanding of price in relation to quality; the ability to negotiate.


Base Group – **Music** – this group will be responsible for selecting the musical entertainment to augment an event. It will be their job to chose groups that not only can play and sing well, but also know how to turn the volume down, when asked. Additional qualifications: an enjoyment of music; the ability to negotiate price; understanding talent.

Base Group – Rental Items – this group will be responsible for securing any rental items needed at an event. Additional qualifications: the ability to comparison shop; to cost justify; to enjoy quality bargain hunting.

That about covers all aspects of planning an event. If I omitted a category, please bring it to my attention. I hope you will let me know which categories you can help me with. You'll get more out of GAST by taking an active part!

GAST History

The German-American Society of Tulsa (GAST) was officially established on January 24,1980, when the State of Oklahoma signed the Society's Certificate of Incorporation as a nonprofit corporation.

We began informal organization activities during the latter part of 1979 as a result of the great popularly of Tulsa's first Oktoberfest. A group of interested nativeborn Germans met to organize the German-American Society of Tulsa and elected Josef Hardt as the Society's first president. The founding members were: Hans A. Boettcher, Ted and Ursula Castle, Stan and Barbara Conrad, Josef and Anneliese Hardt, Siegfried and Dorothea Heit, Christine Manning, Ludwig and Rosie Obermaier, and John and Irmgard Toschik.

Although still a very young organization, GAST has established itself in twenty short years as one of the most active ethnic groups in Tulsa and in Oklahoma. We publish a monthly newsletter, "Das Deutsche Echo" and also provide a website that features our public events and various details about our Society.

The propagation and study of the German language and culture is one of our main objectives. In support of this, German-language classes were instituted two months after our founding. These classes are open to our members and to the general public. We are still offering two ten-week courses each year. Moreover, we established an annual high school essay contest, based on German issues or topics; additionally, we contribute to University scholarship funds each year.

The GAST Sänger join National German Singing Organization

The GAST Sänger have joined the NORD-AMERIKANISCHER SÄNGERBUND. This is a national organization to promote German singing. It will provide us with new songs and ideas from other German choirs across the country. We have been placed in the St. Louis District, which includes choirs from St. Louis, Kansas City, Concordia and Cole Camp, Mo. We will be with all of these groups at the songfest at Cole Camp in June. We have been asked to sing six songs, while all the other choirs are allowed only three. The St. Louis choirs are excited about being in this group and want to hear from us for the first time. An honor for us!

The size of our choir entitles us to three voting delegates to the national convention and allows us to sing with the group. Our first opportunity for that will be in the summer of 2004, when we plan to travel to Peoria, II., and sing in the national choir there.

We are excited and proud to represent GAST in this organization. I am proud to be the director of this choir and have a lot of fun doing it - most of the time! We have a great bunch of singers and they continue to teach me more German. Watch for more news about your choir in this newsletter. Rumor has it that new CDs are forthcoming!

In 1980, the most visible groups of GAST were established: the GAST Folk Dancers, and our choir, "Die GAST Sänger". Regular performances at festivals, in schools, churches, nursing homes and retirement centers have made them renowned in the city and across the state. Since our organization was indirectly created out of Tulsa's first Oktoberfest, GAST is involved as a major sponsor and active participant in this, one of the largest family festivals in the Midwest, which features big bands – Heilbronner Stadtkapelle, Egertaler Blaskapelle – as well as small Austrian and German musical groups. Other groups active within the society are the Speaker's Bureau, Elferrat, a literary discussion group and a needlework group. We also participate in Kid's World and conduct children's Easter and Christmas parties, as well as children's German-language lessons.

In 1981 we formed the German-American Society Arts Association, not for profit, tax-deductible corporation. As a function of the Arts Association, we held an evening of classical German music and poetry entitled "Heimweh," and hosted a 65-member German choral group from Krefeld. Since that time, our Arts Association has conducted at least one major cultural enrichment event each year.

We initiated "Die Deutsche Konversationsrunde" in 1983 as a program under the auspices of the Arts Association to encourage the use of the German language, as well as to foster cultural interests of our members. Anneliese Hardt began this series and served as its program chairman until her death. We also implemented a monthly German-language movie series during 1985 that continues today.

We formed the German-American Society Building Corporation in 1986, for the purpose of acquiring and operating a permanent meeting facility. In 1991, with the help of a generous benefactor, the Building Corporation completed the purchase of a beautiful building on historic 15th Street in Tulsa. This building serves as a home for our membership, and was christened: "The GAST Center". Since that time, renovation of the building has proceeded to improve facilities for our language classes, entertainment, speakers, meetings, and as home of the Dr. Albert and Hete Barthelmes Library. To offset the cost of operating the Center, we also lease it to the general public for meetings, parties and weddings.

GAST is a not for profit 501 (c)(4) social organization. German American Arts Association is a not for profit 501 (c)(3) charitable organization. Our income is primarily generated from our food booth sales during Oktoberfest, Mayfest, and Kids' World, donations and our annual Garage Sale. At this time, we are looking into the feasibility of establishing an endowment fund to ensure the viability of our organization for the long term.
