There's quite a program scheduled that I'm sure you've heard about.



Folkdancers travel to Germany

GAST folkdancers, 7 of them, are off to the BundesVolkstanztreffen of the Deutsche Gesellschaft for Volkstanz e.V. in Offenburg, in the beautiful Black Forest region of Germany. We will join 27 dancers from other groups in the US to represent the North-American Federation of German Folk Dance Groups at this event. "We" are the North-American Sector of the DGV; other sections are the Germans in Kazakhstan and Siberia, as well as the Germans in Brazil. There will be groups from other European and Middle Eastern countries at the 3 day festival from July 31 to August 3. Altogether there should be between 2000 and 2500 dancers. We intend to perform an American square dance medley and join others in traditional German community dances. We expect to learn some new dances at the workshops offered. Everyone pays their own travel expenses with GAST covering the festival registration and the 3 nights hotel. We wish to thank the GAST



board for supporting the Folk Dancers in this endeavor.

On Friday, August 15 the GAST Folk Dancers will resume weekly practice sessions to learn some of these new dances as we prepare for a busy fall season. We will be accepting new members between August 15 and September 5. By then we will have our first booking at Choctaw, Oklahoma's Oktoberfest. Please consider joining the group.


