Editorial

A large majority of our members were not born in Germany. Many of them have never visited Germany. Yet, there is much interest about things German. Whether its beer, Pretzles, Kartoffelpuffer (potato pancakes). Bratwurst, Oktoberfest, Germanfest, or the Chicken Dance, people seem to be interested—and that's great!

In the early days, some thirty years or so ago, the membership mix was mostly German-born, a congregation of immigrants, eager to continue enjoying the foods and practices of their homeland. Thus, GAST was born. We bought a building and made it our home, investing in lots of sweat and equity. We expanded into the Arts Association and the Building Corporation with their unique contributions to the entity that is now collectively known as GAST.

Over time, as the early member-pioneers of GAST faded into a minority, and as the German-born component grew older and fewer, feeling less inclined or able to participate in the rigors of working Oktoberfest, or volunteering to staff leadership positions, our new leadership became slowly composed of American-born members and, membership interest started to shift away from old German values, the type of music to be played, preference for casual dress code over formal, etc. etc. At this point, going back to the good old days becomes no longer possible.

This process is normal and called paradigm shift. Other German-based organizations across the country are experiencing the same phenomenon: a shift toward an Americanized German style of operation, which satisfies the majority of their current membership and encourages and attracts new members. As a result, this shift may alienate the early founding and charter members and hasten their lack of participation. This is unfortunate, but current leadership must cater to the mood and mentality of its primary membership while still maintaining certain German aspects in its various functions.

Failing to accommodate this paradigm shift would eventually result in a rapidly declining membership and the death of GAST. Let's keep it going, What do you say?
