As it was we had around 120 people present and received \$64 in donations, which were given to the Barthelmes Conservatory for their scholarship program. Some of the students from last year were among those present and an exciting new aspect, African drums, was also presented. It is my sincere hope that when these young people once again give of their time and talent, that our organization will hear the call and help to encourage these future Mozarts, Beethovens and Brahms to continue to enrich our lives with music.

Thank you to the **Pizzos, Frankens, Mertens, and Seibolds** for their generous monetary donations, which will help Arts continue their excellent cultural offerings under the leadership of **Gertrud Schmidt**, **Barbara Conrad** and **Charles Meyers.** I suspect that more donations may be underway or received. 
