

Greetings to all the members from the new Arts President.

Thirty years of age ... and going strong... that's the German American Society of Tulsa Arts Association.

The leadership has changed but not its mission: "Promote and maintain German and European culture, customs and language and establish and maintain a cultural and social organization".

Under this umbrella the Arts Association will continue to offer language classes for adults and children, concerts, Speakers Bureau, movie evenings, Konversationsrunde, Adventfeier, and celebrate German American Day and Volkstrauertag.

As is almost tradition the cultural events start off with the "American Theater Organ Concert" August 19, 2011. Performers will treat the audience to a repertoire of some well known and some not so well known pieces for organ music.

An evening with pianist Jeongwon Ham September 18, 2011, is a must for lovers of piano music. Jeongwon graduated with highest distinction from the Folkwang Hochschule für Musik in Essen and the Hochschule der Künste in Berlin. She will be playing pieces by Liszt, Chopin and Schumann.

The Tulsa Symphony Orchestra is offering an expanded season with a new program "Flavor of Europe" chamber series of three concerts. The first "Germany" (Brahms, Bach, Mozart) will be held at the GAST Center November 18, 2011, at 6:30 pm. There will be a cover charge of \$ 25.00.

Oldest Giant Wine Barrel to be Tapped!

The world's oldest giant wine barrel, measuring five metres (nearly 16.5 feet), held in a Saxony-Anhalt hunting mansion, after being refilled for the first time in 400 years will be tapped for an upcoming three-day festival organized for the express purpose of marking the re-opening of the cask.

The barrel holds nearly 144,000 litres of wine and weighs about 53 tons empty.

The barrel took two years for construction by craftsmen in the nearby village of Groningen and was finished in 1594 and filled in time for the wedding of the Duke of Brunswick, Heinrich Julius, to Princess Elisabeth of Denmark. It was moved into its specially built wine cellar of Lord Ludwig von Spiegel in 1781.

A local restaurateur, Chris Schone, will crack the seal and serve red wine to the massive gathering.

Cole Camp Sängerfest

The GAST Sänger have just returned from their annual trip to Cole Camp in Missouri for the twentieth annual Cole Camp Sängerfest (Singers Festival) held on the 11th of June. This conference was originally organized in 1991 by Neil Heimsoth for the purpose of preserving German music and is an open-air evening performance by the local German Children's Choir (Kinderchor), the local German Women's Choir (Damenchor), the local German Men's Choir (Männerchor), and the combined Mixed Choir

(Gemischter Chor), always featuring performances by individuals and groups from other areas, the Tulsa GAST Choir, led by director **Susan Calvert**, being a well received fixture of this annual festival.

This year's meeting honored the composer Friedrich Silcher in the afternoon concert while the evening performance featured music ranging from Wagner to Brahms to Guonod/Ophoven. The choirs practice approximately four months for this concert and their hard work is greatly enjoyed by the attendees. Selections range from the serious to the hilarious, and perhaps the most lighthearted was this year's rendition by the St. Louis Liederkranz of a medley of German "homeland" songs interspersed with unlikely



additions. The singers were treated to a fine meal and shots of ApfelKorn. GAST will certainly return next year for more. It's an occasion everyone anticipates and relishes. Besides that, it's a rolling party from beginning to end.

Cole Camp is a small town in Benton County, Missouri, population of 1,028 at the 2000 Census, a site of one of the earliest skirmishes in the American Civil War and is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Where am I?

This unique structure is a city gate marking off the western boundary of an old center of this Hanseatic town. A brick gothic construction, it is one of the relics of this medieval city's fortifications and one of only two remaining city gates. Because its two round towers and arched entrance are so well known it is regarded today as a symbol of this German city and together with the old city center it has been a UNESCO World Heritage site since 1987. The view shown here is from the field side of the gate. On

the city side over the entranceway it reads: "SPQL" framed by the years 1477 and 1871, the first year being the supposed date of construction (although the correct date is now known to be 1478), the latter date being the gate's restoration and the founding of the German Reich. According to **Fred Rother** the structure has developed a distinct lean, which you can almost see in this photograph!

The Tulsa-Celle-Partnership

This Tulsa Global Alliance Partnership was created to promote a Sister City relationship between Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Celle, Germany, a picture postcard city of approximately 70,000 inhabitants in Lower Saxony on the banks of the River Aller, a tributary of the Weser. First established in the 10th century as a fishing bay, Celle has a picturesque old town center with more than 400 original and beautifully restored half timber-framed houses, as those in the old city center (right). The Tulsa-Celle Partnership was created in





2000 with a mutual exchange of representatives and a partnership agreement signed by representatives in each city. Since 2000 there have been exchanges of students, businesmen, clergy, groups of all kinds, and multitudes of individuals and representatives of both cities.

Celle Castle (left), one of the residences of the House of Brunswick-Lüneburg, is a four-winged building and the largest castle in the southern Lüneburg Heath region. The Castle overlooks the Ältstadt.
