



Hitze Ferien any one? But as the saying goes: "When the going gets tough, the tough get going". Some hardy souls ventured out in the 100+ degree heat on Wednesday, the 13th of July to attend our first Art Committee Meeting under the leadership of Arnold Bieber. Thank you Arnold, Gwen Bieber, Doris Wicks, Lori Hall, Mary Jane Mueller, Jutta Tankersly and Fred Rother for getting the planning for the 2011/2012 events off the ground.

Want to shake the summer doldrums? Get out and attend the American Theater Organ Society (ATOS) concert on August 19th at 7:30 pm. Light refreshments will be served afterwards by our hostesses Gwen and Lori.

Did you know that the organ is the oldest keyboard instrument. It dates back to about 250 BC and was called the Hydraulus. For a long time it was thought that sound was made by rushing water. Wrong! After a Hydraulus was unearthed by archeologists in Rome, physicists figured out, that water was used to stabilize the air pressure. As time went on organs got bigger and better and became the prime instrument in Christian churches. Bach is synonymous with organ music and many famous composers wrote music for the "Queen of the instruments". The world's largest church organ is in Passau—built by Steinmeyer in 1924 it features 5 manuals, 208 registers and 17,000 (yes - seventeen thousand) pipes.

So where did the Theater Organs come in. During the late 19th and early 20th century people wanted more sound in theaters than a piano could supply and often there was neither space nor money for an orchestra. Robert Hope-Jones (of Wurlitzer fame), Welte and sons and Walcker had an idea... the Theater Organ was born. These organs had their hay days during the silent film era where soundtracks underscored the action on the screen and also were popular in smaller theaters where music of the lighter fare was presented. The end of the silent film era however diminished the demand for these versatile instruments. The 'home organ' (Hammond, Wurlitzer) made its debut around the late 1950's .

Smaller churches availed themselves of the theater organ as well. That's where our wonderful 'Geneva' organ comes in. This instrument, - a hybrid between a church organ and a theater organ, - with 3 manuals and about 700 pipes was acquired along with the building which now is our "GAST" house. The architecture of the great hall of the building which was planned as a church makes for wonderful acoustic. Come and hear for yourself!

I will tell you all about Jeonwang Ham, German American day etc., etc. in the next Echo.



Interesting News from the Old Country

Bird Brained Plan in Germany to replace body hunting dogs with trained vultures fails to get

off the ground!

A plan by German detectives to replace sniffer dogs with trained vultures has run into a headwind after the feathered sleuths showed little interest in helping police with their inquiries, The (London) Times reported earlier this month.

In theory their advantage over dogs in finding bodies seemed clear; they can spot a dead mouse from more than 1,000m and fly over terrain that would tire or stop the most dedicated hound in its tracks.

Three turkey vultures, led by a magnificent specimen named Sherlock, were therefore trained by enthusiastic police near Hanover, Lower Saxony. Fitted with tracking devices, the hope was that these winged scouts would help to bring speedy closure to body hunts, relief to grieving relatives and swifter justice to villains.

Two young vultures named Columbo and Miss Marple were brought into the park last year from Austria, supposedly to learn from Sherlock. "But the young ones can't do anything, besides fight with each other," he said.
