NEW POLICIES ADOPTED BY THE BOARD

PRIVACY STATEMENT: Effective immediately, the Board of Directors amended its policy to provide for publication in the ECHO and posting on the GAST Website of the names of members only without street addresses, phones or e-mails. GAST will continue to print names, addresses, telephones and email addresses in our membership directory. Permission will be obtained prior to any other member information being published. GAST does not sell its address, phone or e-mail lists.

ROSTER INFORMATION UPDATE: In an effort to update our records for correct addresses, phone numbers and emails, the Board of Directors created a committee, Jennifer Kearns chair, to begin contacting all members to confirm that the information we have on file is accurate. ...from the Arts President



Sprechen sie Deutsch? If not, you missed a chance to sign up for German Language classes offered by the GAST Arts Association. On February 4th ten eager youngsters started Kinderdeutsch with teacher **Angelique Giddins**. They learn the numbers, colors, simple sentences and some Lieder under the loving baton of **Hildegard Schaffrin** who can't remember how many children she has taught over more than 30 years of GAST's Lieder Teacher. Their favorite song? 'Muss I den zum Staedtele hinaus'. They sounded very nice when they performed it for us last week. Singing goes with dancing and that's what **Madeleine Schaffrin** teaches the children who after the mental exercises are ready for some physical action.

Adult language classes started February 7, 2012 with 35 participants. Classes range from: Beginner, Intermediate and Advanced German. **Ruth Obermark** and her teachers **Sindy Andrews, Carol Martin, Grete McNac, Melanie Roberson, Marianne Strong** (substitute) and **Jutta Tankersly** were ready to receive and work with the new and continuing students.

Both, English and German belong to the West Germanic Language Group so it is not surprising that there are many similarities between the modern English and German language.

After the collapse of the West Roman Empire the Danes, Frisians and Anglo-Saxons invaded England which had been under Rome's control for almost 400 years. Some of you may remember from history lessons that 1066 AD the Normans invaded England and at that time Franco-Roman was added to the language 'Gemisch' of Celtic-Roman-Anglo-Saxon origin.

In what is now Germany, the Germanic dialects of the various tribes—from the Prussians to the Bavarians were unified into what is called 'High German' by Martin Luther with the translation of the Bible from Latin into German. Both modern English and German are living languages to which new words and terms are added

as needed. Just read Walther von der Vogelweide the German Minnesinger (1170-1230 AD) or the writings by the English poet Geoffrey Chaucer (1343-1400 AD) to appreciate the many changes that have occurred in the German and English languages. No need to go that far back in history though. Have you noticed during your last visit to Germany or Austria how many English words have been adopted there into everyday use since the end of WW II?

Speech is a very powerful tool. So let us use it to the best of our abilities in German or English. Test your German when **Elizabeth Fischborn** entertains us with excerpts from Operettas on Sunday, May 25, 2012, at 3pm in the Great Hall of our GAST House. Thank you **Barbara Conrad** for finding this gem for us.

The talented students of the Barthelmes Academie want to share with us some of the beautiful music they have learned to play. **Arnold Bieber** is in the process of finding a mutually agreeable date for their performance. More about it in the next Echo.



Witchcraft Trial Reopens in Germany After Almost 400 Years

Cologne, Germany—A German witchcraft trial was set to reopen Monday, the 13th of February, after almost 400 years, in a bid to clear the name of a woman who was burned at the stake in 1627.

Katharina Henoth was head of the post office in Cologne, Germany, when she was charged with witchcraft, tortured and eventually sentenced to death, despite her protests of innocence, the Kolner Stadt-Anzeiger reported.

She was accused, among other things, of causing the illness and death of several people, but it is thought the charges against her may have been politically motivated.

Hartmut Hegeler, a 65 year old retired priest, is bringing the case to the same city authority that convicted Henoth four centuries ago, where he hopes she will be acquitted.

He told the newspaper that the city's appeals committee had an "historic opportunity" to clear Henoth's name and take "a symbolic stand against a violation of human dignity." Hegeler decided to fight to clear Henoth's name af-



ter a group of students he taught at a local college asked him when the women who were convicted of witchcraft charges were later acquitted, and he realized that they had not been.

He also hopes that the committee will acquit the other alleged witches sentenced to death in Cologne. *Article reprinted from NewsCore*
