Fellow members of GAST:

It's that season again when we tend to hibernate in our airconditioned rooms. Shake off the summer-heat lethargy and attend the American Theater Organ Society's (ATOS) meeting and concert on Friday 17th of August at 7:00pm in the GAST Center Great Hall. While I can't give you the complete program yet, it promises to be a fun evening with Bill Roland on the Piano livening things up with Rag-time music, the organists entertaining us with show tunes from the Thirties Era (oldies but goodies!) and our own Blaskapelle enticing us to tap our toes to the rhythms of many popular and some not so well known musical creations. Wind and percussion instruments are some of the oldest musical

instruments played by primitive and civilized people all over the globe. SCIENTISTS AT KIEL AND HAMBURG UNIVERSITIES DISCOVER WORLD'S LIGHTEST MATERIAL

Engineers at two German universities have accidentally discovered the lightest material in the world. Dubbing it "Aerographite, the carbon-based material with a graphitelike structure is both flexible and super-strong, and has only a 75th the weight of styrofoam. Aerographite is high-

ly porous and is composed 99.9% of air.

The material was discovered in September 2010 purely by chance by Matthias Mecklenburg, a PhD student working at the University of Hamburg. Mecklenburg is part of Hamburg's cluster of excellence called Integrated Material Systems. Mecklenburg and his mentor, Professor Karl Schulte and colleagues under Professor Rainer Adelung at the Christian Albrechts University in Kiel have

been collectively working on presentation of this new material to the world, with their results published in the July issue of of the journal Advanced Materials.

Professor Schulte explained that the material is somewhat like the Eiffel Tower, a light-weight structure, with various bars or girders connecting each other and nothing between them but air.

Asked how the materials was discovered by chance, the

Professor explained: "We were studying some threedimensional material. This materials had been produced at Kiel University by a group headed by Professor Rainer Adelung. They had formed a zinc-oxide material which was three-dimensional in structure, but it was a massive material. We both came together and decided to try to put it into a reactor, where we could grow carbon tubes onto it. Then, we looked into the reactor and saw that part of the zinc-oxide had disappeared. But at those locations, where the zinc-oxide once was, we found a very small area cov-



ered with a see-through material. Later, through further investigation, we found that this was a carbon-like material, and then later still we found it had a graphite structure. So, the old material just disappeared and we had this carbon structure [in its place]." Aerographite also has electrical conductivity,

and a possible employment for the material may be in batteries which could perhaps be produced both lighter and with higher capacity. The Professor also surmises that the material could be used in super-capacitors because it has a very high surface area. Numerous other uses for the material will doubtless be discovered. *Story by David Forbes, Editor*


