In 1983 Ronald Reagan proclaimed October 6 as German-American Day to commemorate the date exactly 300 years before when thirteen German families, emigrating from Krefeld inNorth Rhine-Westphalia, landed near Philadelphia, later founding Germantown, Pennsylvania, the first major German settlement in the thirteen colonies. In August of 1987 Congress finally acted to designate October 6 German-American Day which President Reagan signed into law on August 18, 1987. The designation recognizes more than three centuries of German immigration to the U.S. and contribution to the industry, sciences, arts and economy of this country. In a formal White House ceremony President Reagan called upon all Americans to celebrate the date annually with festivities appropriate to the occasion.

GAST celebrates German-American Day annually on the Sunday nearest to October 6, this year on the 7th of October. The event, as always, is free and open to the public.

Donations are accepted to help defray costs.

Refreshments will be served, including cake, cookies, cheeses and crackers, fruits, coffee, and wine.

MEMBER INTERVIEW: Arnold Bieber

1. Arnold, tell us your educational and professional background? -

I came to this country in 1957 at the age of 22 with a formal education and apprenticeship in industrial business. Unable to find a job in my field in my new hometown Chicago, I settled for temporary work in retail sales.

Uncle Sam came calling a few months later, inviting me to experience Oklahoma and Texas in an Army green uniform.

After discharge from the Service I lived in Oklahoma City and Duncan, OK for a number of years before moving back to Chicago. There I worked in Sales and Purchasing at a Metal Service Center and met my wife Gwen. My privately owned employer was acquired by Tulsa based Williams Companies. We moved to Broken Arrow in 1977, moved to Philadelphia in 1986 and back to Broken Arrow in 1997 when I retired.

2. How long have you been a member of GAST and how did you happen to join?

A colleague of mine who was married to a German woman told me about GAST and the fun he was having working Oktoberfest. Gwen and I first joined GAST in 1981, then again after our return from Philadelphia.

3. When and how did you or your ancestors first come to the U.S.?

Relatives on my mother's side immigrated to Pennsylvania in the late 19th century, followed by aunts and uncles after WW I.

I was born in a small town in Masuria, East Prussia which is now part of Poland. My father owned a business making and repairing farm wagons and equipment. An uncle encouraged me to try life in the US during his visit to Germany in 1955. I am totally German, naturalized American citizen since 1962.

4. Do you have children? Grandchildren?

Between my wife and me we have 5 children and 8 grandchildren. Most of them live in the Tulsa area, some live in Texas and one granddaughter lives in Wisconsin.

5. Is there one particular job, committee, or festival you really enjoy more than any other?

I enjoy all of the GAST family and activities. There is less pressure now that I serve on various committees, rather than as president of the Arts Association and GAST.

6. Do you have a hobby, or a favorite activity that might surprise other members?

It's probably not a surprise that I enjoy fishing and boating when it's not too hot or too cold.

7. What kind of reading do you enjoy, and what was the last book that you read? Do you prefer to read in German or English or are you indifferent?

I read newspapers and magazines in English and German. I prefer non-fiction books and the internet. The last book I finished was probably a James Michener novel.






