...from the Arts President — Gertrud Schmidt

The 'Neuer Pennsylvanischer Staatsbote' the Newsletter of the German Society of Pennsylvania landed in our mailbox around Christmas. The headline that

caught my eye and sparked my interest was the announcement of the 250th Anniversary celebration of the German Society of Pennsylvania. Not many societies, clubs or organizations can celebrate a 250th birthday. How did they do it? Three cheers for the German Society of Pennsylvania.

One question I asked was: when did German immigrants first arrive in Oklahoma. Here is OK History 101: Oklahoma was a part of Louisiana Territory which belonged to France. In 1803 Jefferson bought it from Napoleon who was busy fighting wars in Europe and needed money. It was 'Unassigned Land' until 1830 when part of it became Indian Territory by the 1830 Removal Act. President Jackson started to relocate the Native American Tribes who - by treaty or force had lost their ancestral lands east of the Mississippi- to this "unsettled" Territory. Of course there were Native people living in this area. After 1834 there were 60 different tribes living in this land- not always peacefully. In the late 19th century farmers and new immigrants hungered for land. The unassigned lands were opened to settlers in 1889 – the famous Oklahoma Land Run. And during this event German farmers and businessmen entered the state and made it their home. Because of the rush to stake out a claim families were scattered all over the territory and therefore initially no German communities were formed There were 739 German- born residents in Oklahoma Territory in 1890. Oklahoma Territory and Indian Territory merged to become the State of Oklahoma in 1907. At the first United States decennial census in 1910 27,599 residents are listed as German-born. By that time small German communities had been formed established German language churches. schools, newspapers and social clubs. WWI was a difficult time for the Germans. They were forced to give up their native language and customs. A priest was thrown in jail because he administered the last

'Neuer rites to a parishioner in German. During the next 30 years the German population in Oklahoma dropped to 5900. There was also a shift from farms to the ania - cities - Oklahoma City and Tulsa in particular.

After WWII a new wave of immigrants arrived in the US from Germany and German nationalists from Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Russia and Yugoslavia, and many settled in Oklahoma. These new arrivals were craftsmen, professionals and academics and German wives of American Service men . This led to a renewed interest in German culture and formation of Social Clubs, choirs and literary groups.

Which brings me to GAST! Who? When? Where? What? There are several names that are indelibly associated with the German American Society of Tulsa: Joe Hardt (1927-2009) who as a very young man came from Oberhausen to New York and then to Tulsa where he married Anneliese and worked for more than 30 years for Channel 2. When the River Parks Department mused about some Fall Festival for Tulsa it was Joe who suggested Oktoberfest... and he became known as Mr. Oktoberfest. Together with Siegfried and Dorothea Heit, John and Irmgard Toschik, Stan and Barbara Conrad, Ted and Ursula Castle and Ludwig and Rosie Obermaier and others, they formed GAST and incorporated this organization on January 22, 1980. So we are 34 years old! Do you think we will make it to 250? For tax reasons the ARTS section of GAST was incorporated January 12, 1981 and the business section aka GAST Building March 26 1986. Joe Hardt was GAST's first president and held that position for three years. Through the hard work of the members and the generosity of Dr. & Mrs. Barthelmes GAST was in a position to acquire the Church of Christ Scientist Building which now is our wonderful GAST Center.

The mission of all three parts of this organization is: "Preserve and promote the German language, culture, traditions and customs through educational and social events for the enrichment of its members and the community".

Come, help support your organization.

Interesting News from the Old Country



The German defense ministry has issued new rules on soldiers' dress code. From now on "dirty" tattoos, ostentatious piercings and bushy beards have all been outlawed. The Bundeswehr's first update to the regulations in years dedicates a new section to "body modifications", also including implants, brandings, decorative scars and piercings inside the mouth cavity

Ordinance A.26301.1I, on the Appearance of Federal Troops" caught the eye of military blogger Thomas Wiegold - "something of a weathervane of army opinion" according to Der Spiegel magazine. The 200-plus comments from soldiers on his blog post outnumber those on more serious issues.

As well as the ban on mohawks and bushy beards, new rules on tattoos proved particularly controversial. They are permitted, but discriminatory, pornographic and unconstitutional" images must always be covered up when soldiers are in uniform. The rule applies even if they appear on the hands, neck or face - which, as the comments note, could prove difficult.

Tubular piercings in the mouth must be removed, and those in ears must be covered with "fleshtone material". Magnetic implants are forbidden altogether.

It is not clear how the army intends to implement the regulations, but the Der Spiegel expects more guidelines to follow soon.
